

On this trip, we will be visiting the City of York, which was founded nearly 2000 years ago by the Roman Empire. This walled city is the capital of Yorkshire and has a lot of heritage to offer as well as great shops and cafes.

Its huge 13th-century Gothic Cathedral, York Minster, has medieval stained glass and two functioning bell towers. The City Walls form a walkway on both sides of the River Ouse. One of the favourite streets in York is called Shambles. It is an old street with overhanging timberframed buildings, some dating back as far as the fourteenth century. Nearby is Shambles Market, which is home to more than 85 stalls with pottery, artisan breads, crafts and vintage clothing.

EDINBURGH

Saturday 19th November

Recognised as the capital of Scotland since at least the 15th century, Edinburgh is the seat of the Scottish Government, the Scottish Parliament and the highest courts in Scotland. The city's Palace of Holyroodhouse is the official residence of the British monarchy in Scotland. The city has long been a centre of education, particularly in the fields of medicine, Scottish law, literature, philosophy, the sciences, and engineering.

Edingburgh's cultural attractions have made it the UK's second-most visited tourist destination attracting 4.9 million visits. Time Out magazine rated Edinburgh the best city in the world in 2022.

LIVERPOOL


Saturday 11th February

The city has one of the largest collections of Grade 1 listed buildings in the UK and Britain's largest cathedral. There's lots to do there, like a visit to Anfield, one of the most iconic football stadiums in the world, or delving into the past of Britain's most iconic band!

LAKE DISTRICT

Keswick is a market town, surrounded by mountains and on a hilltop east of the town, Castlerigg Stone Circle dates back to the Neolithic era. Derwent Water is a lake south of town, where you can book a boat tour. Keswick has quirky shops, cafe's and a market on Saturday.

HOLY ISLAND & BAMBURGH

Holy Island:

Skim over the sands and causeway to Holy Island and prepare to enter another world. Lying just a few miles off the Northumberland coast, Holy Island is cut off twice daily from the rest of the world by fast-moving tides. Both an island and a picturesque village, Holy Island carries a wealth of history within its tidal walls.

See one of the region's most revered treasures Lindisfarne Priory. The epicenter of Christianity in Anglo Saxon times, Lindisfarne Priory was once the home of St Oswald. This serene setting was the birthplace of the Lindisfarne Gospels, one of the world's most precious books.

Vikings invaded in the 8th century and the evocative ruins of Lindisfarne Priory includes the famous "rainbow bridge" which spirals skywards with the ghost of a long-vanished tower.

Bamburgh: THINGS TO DO

Bamburgh is home to a pristine beach, drifting sand dunes, little cafes and restaurants tucked away on street corners and a magnificent view of the castle everywhere you turn. As the royal capital of the ancient kingdom of Northumbria, spell-binding Bamburgh holds a history worth discovering. You can wander down the main street, past the cosy Copper Kettle Cafe and towards the village's landmark red phone box for an especially beautiful view.

Whitby is a seaside town with some of the best fish and chips around! The town is divided in two by the harbour and the River Esk Estuary. The older part of the town, located on the East bank, there is a lot of narrow medieval streets, while the newer town is found on the opposite bank.

If ever a town was associated with a literary character, it is Whitby and Count Dracula. Author Bram Stoker stayed in Whitby in the late 1800s, and was so inspired by its ruined abbey and clifftop church he created his most famous character. Dracula arrives in this country after his ship runs aground off Whitby, and runs up the famous 199 steps in the guise of a black dog.

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
